## Written in Heaven

"Do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you; rejoice rather that your names are written in heaven." *Luke 10: 20* 

These are the words that Jesus spoke to the seventy-two after they returned, rejoicing because their mission had been successful. They were overjoyed that, through Jesus' name, even demons were under their power! But Jesus told them to rejoice not because of what they could do, but because their identity was secured in heaven.

Sharing in the mission of Jesus can be difficult, but everyone is called to do it - not just adults and priests but children too. Some actions might seem insignificant, but God can take what we offer Him and make it extra ordinary. In the w/c 8th July, children learnt about some people throughout history who have taken on Jesus' mission. Their stories are described briefly below, but you might like to explore them further:

• **Andrew van der Bijl** – Brother Andrew was given the nickname

'God's Smuggler' because he repeatedly risked his life to smuggle bibles into communist countries during the Cold War. He is known for praying "Lord, make seeing eyes blind," before stopping at the border of a communist country for his car to be inspected.

• Rosa Parks – In 1955 in Montgomery, Alabama, Rosa Parks refused to give up her bus seat in the 'coloured section' to a white passenger, after the whitesonly section was filled. She was arrested for civil disobedience and her simple action led to her being called the 'mother of the civil rights movement'. She said, "God has always given me the strength to say what is right."

• Saint Genevieve – Born in France around 400 years after the time of Jesus, Genevieve was so determined to 'live her life only for God' that she became a nun at the age of just 15. In 451 when Paris was under threat from Attila the Hun, Genevieve persuaded

At Ten Ten we hope that these stories of faith and sacrifice will inspire children to know that with Jesus, they too can do incredible things, and whilst they may find reward on earth, their real reward waits for them in heaven.
